

CApacity Building in Asia for Resilience EducaTion: Improving multi-hazard early warning to increase disaster resilience among coastal communities

CABARET (Capacity Building in Asia for Resilience EducaTion) was a three-year project co-funded by the European Union's Erasmus+ programme. Its aim was to strengthen research and innovation capacity for the development of societal resilience to disasters.

The project supported the UN Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction, agreed by member states in 2015. This included a strong call for higher education to support the understanding of disaster risk. It also identified their role in promoting risk-informed decisions and risk sensitive planning from local to global levels.
